

Southeastern Yearly Meeting

Interim Business Meeting, 10/01/05

The Fall Interim Business Meeting of the Southeastern Yearly Meeting, Religious Society of Friends, gathered at the Palm Beach meetinghouse, Lake Worth FL, on October 1, 2005.

Following morning worship, committee meetings were held. These minutes record the FIBM held in the afternoon. The numbered minutes appear within the narrative and as a separate attachment. [Attachment 1: Numbered Minutes, SEYM Fall Interim Business Meeting, 10/1/05.]

The meeting began with silent worship. IBM clerk, Nancy Fennell, had welcoming words for Friends.

The clerk proceeded with the **Roll Call of Meetings and Worship Groups**, including milestones. [Attachment 2: Attendees]

Dan Vaughn/DeLand PM shared the passing of wife Susan's stepfather. He was a planter, lawyer, and a member of Gwynned MM/PYM. Tom Fennell/ Ft. Myers told of the loss of Friend Richard Squires and attender Dan Stanley. Palm Beach held a memorial service for member Muriel Barker. Tampa reported the wedding of Rick and Amy Souza.

Announcements included a request for Friends to write a message on the "Missing You" cards to Annie McPherson and Beverly Bird, who are recovering from surgery. A card was also sent to Gay Howard, who has moved to California.

The **Executive Committee** presented one action item recommending the YM Gathering Committee clerk be a member of the Executive Committee. Friends approved the following minute.

05IBM10 IBM recommends the YM Gathering Committee clerk be a permanent member of the Executive Committee.

There was no **Worship and Ministry** Report. However, it was stated Frank Massey/Baltimore Yearly Meeting will be the 2006 Michener Lecturer.

Phoebe Andersen/Tallahassee reported for the **Faith & Practice** committee. The report appears in the *Documents In Advance* (DIA), page 3.

As the revision of SEYM's *Faith & Practice* continues, meetings have been mailed two new sections to consider: *Blessed Community: Quaker Faith, Practice, and Testimony* and *Concerns, Leadings, and Testimonies*. New, second draft copies of *Meeting for Worship* and the *Monthly Meeting* appear in and are considered part of the FIBM DIA. These documents are on the SEYM website, and will be discussed at the Winter IBM.

As items to be included in the *Faith & Practice*, Phoebe requested Friends submit special statements of faith or a favorite passage that resonates with an individual. The committee is also soliciting contemporary as well as traditional statements of faith: one's measure of the Light and "new" Light.

Barbara Wolfe/Tampa updated Friends on the **YM Gathering**. Registration fees will remain the same as last year. But, the camp has raised fees for room and board. Since there is no Gathering surplus to supplement a likely shortfall, costs will need to be met from other sources.

There will be simple meals, and the committee is still accepting ideas and requests for interest groups. Kindly submit proposals in writing. The 2006 YM Gathering theme is *Here I am Lord*.

Ernestine and Vincent Buscemi, New York/ Morningside Friends Meeting will give the Walton Lecture. The Buscemis are active in Quaker organizations. They both serve on FGC's Committee for Ministry on Racism.

There was no report by the **Youth** Committee.

The new committee clerk, Cece Yocum, gave the **Peace and Social Concerns** committee report.

Jan Hamilton/Palm Beach will be the committee's recording clerk. Cece spoke of Quakers' concerns in troubled times, the SEYM peace web page, and Friends' concern for the victims of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Jim Weston/Sarasota informed that his meeting's contact with Friends in the storm affected area. A query was raised: Should there be a SEYM "first response committee" to such situations? Clearness is needed.

Concerning our testimony on Peace, area efforts point to the peace project at Miami's Bartram House and AVP workshop proposals in the Tampa Bay area.

As a Friend who has been deeply involved with the trauma suffered by survivors of the African genocide, Cece explained the work of Peace Teams in the countries of Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda and Burundi. She raised the question of "How can we nurture ourselves?" in SEYM regarding peace and social concerns. Examples of current efforts were noted. Palm Beach has a deep ecology group.

In Tampa a light meditation group seeks greater awareness. For the past eight years, Miami has conducted a worship-sharing group.

The clerk read an epistle from the Congo Yearly Meeting, March 2005.

Cathy Gaskill/Winter Park stated the future of Quakerism is in Africa. "That's where most Quakers are. Just because they don't sit in silence they are still Quakers, and that is where the future is."

Archives, Cuban Quaker Project, and Website committee did not report.

Ruth Paine/St. Pete gave the **ProNica** report. Davida Johns, stateside coordinator and Peg Richards, bookkeeper, are new part-time employees. Davida did the layout for the June newsletter, which was a savings cost. Peg is assisting in designing a QuickBooks Pro accounting application for ProNica.

ProNica has received a legacy from Robert Blum, who assisted in past shipments to Nicaragua. This was in the amount of \$60,942.

Davida had an earlier experience as a photographer in Nicaragua. She spoke of her life's change of direction towards serving others, her involvement with the Peace Corps and other social concerns.

Lillian Hall/Managua remains as a longtime resource in Managua. As coordinator in Nicaragua, she has successfully networked with politicians and progressive organizations. ProNica is now recognized as a legal organization by the Nicaraguan government.

Volunteers to serve ProNica are always needed. Ellie Caldwell/Palm Beach spoke of an activity conducted by Pam Haigh/St. Petersburg. Destitute prostitutes were taught haircutting in order to earn a living not dependent on street life.

Nancy Fennell thanked Davida for her personal sharing.

Ruth distributed to Friends ProNica's stateside balance sheets for FY 2003 -2004 and FY 2004-2005, and the Managua Coordinator's report by Lillian Hall.

Caroline Lanker/Tampa and Lake Wales WG delivered the ad-hoc **Handbook** committee report. At their June 11, 2005, meeting, EC approved a minute [05EC07] to form an ad hoc committee to revise the SEYM handbook, which was last updated in 1994. The handbook is an administrative and procedural document and does not require Friends' formal approval.

The committee members, Nancy Fennell, Lyn Cope-Robinson, Gay Howard, and Caroline Lanker, have requested input from monthly meetings, officers, SEYM committees and representatives. The committee is at the stage of consolidating and writing the document. The objective is to have it in place by YM 2006.

On behalf of the **Half-Yearly Meeting**, Lyn Cope-Robinson reported the HYM clerk, Mike Wilson/St.Petersburg, stated, "all is going well" in planning the gathering. Information flyers are being distributed to monthly meetings. There will be online registration at www.seym.org,

Friends attended to reports by Representatives to Organizations.

A written report by Jessamyn Doan/Tallahassee, a SEYM representative to the **World Gathering of Young Friends**, appears in the Documents in Advance (DIA), page 4. The other SEYM representative to the young Friend's gathering, Devender Sellars/Gainesville, will give a future report. [Devender's personal reflections appear in Gainesville's newsletter (10/2005).

Lyn Cope informed Friends that David Robinson/Space Coast is working for **AFSC** as a member of an assessment crew to determine the needs of Vietnamese, Native Americans, and migrant workers in Alabama and Mississippi. The crew's report will be used to develop an ongoing AFSC response to the calamity suffered by these people following Hurricane Katrina. Grants are available from AFSC to monthly meetings who develop viable assistance plans.

The clerk brought forth the status of **SEYM's relationship to Friends United Meeting (FUM)**. Information has been and will be posted on the website. Monthly meetings are requested, through the clearness process, to develop a Minute that is the sense of the meeting regarding what SEYM's relationship should be to FUM.

Sybil Brennan, the new YM and IBM assistant clerk, spoke enthusiastically about her responsibility to and for SEYM's representatives to other organizations. She received, along with Lyn, several reports from these representatives, and encouraged other representatives to submit regular reports.

SEYM officers and representatives who recently attended functions held by the wider Quaker community include:

In response to their participation in the World Gathering of Young Friends, Jessamyn and Devender wrote letters of appreciation to Sybil.

Sybil stated that SEYM should keep firm in its budgeting triennial meetings. Representative travel expenditures to date: \$1710.09.

There was no **FCNL** report. Cece Yocum, who is a FCNL representative-at-large, did mention that the new building in Washington DC opened the week of October 10. There will be an open house in November for Friends to attend. The FCNL website is being redesigned.

Phoebe Andersen gave the **FUM** report, which appears in the DIA, pages 5 to 9. Phoebe and Neil attended the FUM General Board Meeting before the Triennial, July 13, 2005, and the Triennial Meeting of Friends United Meeting, July 13-17, in Des Moines, Iowa.

Phoebe said the Triennial was a learning experience. FUM is structured differently from FGC. The General Secretary, staff and central committee (General Board) are more empowered than are unprogrammed Quakers in similar positions.

Impressive was the Johnson Lecture speaker Oliver Kisaka Simiyu.

As stated in the SEYM newsletter article, page 10, Phoebe was led to bear witness and share with Friends the measure of Light that SEYM has come to clarity about the position we hold in SEYM's Faith and Practice section on Marriage and Commitment.

The FUM will not change their personnel policy until there is unity within the organization. Phoebe observed we should continue to dialog on issues, build inter-relationships, and pray the way opens for change. We need to interact in a loving way. Differences then become less important.

Neil and Phoebe responded to Friends' questions and comments.

As clerk, Nancy concluded the discussion with a quote she heard at the School of the Spirit: "We cannot speak Truth without Love, else it is not Truth."

Reports were not available from these representatives: **FWCC, FGC, FCNL, FLGBTQC, Quaker Earthcare Witness, and QUNO.**

SEYM **Treasurer** Neil Andersen/Tallahassee summarized the Treasurer's report. [The Treasurer's Report was distributed and is on file.]

The balance sheet for, the budget vs. actual, and income and expenses by class for FY 2004-2005, and the budget vs. actual FYTD were distributed and discussed.

Regarding the last FY income, there was a shortfall of \$1,820.35 for donations. Because of one less newsletter, duplication services and postage/shipping were under the budget by \$1,802.25. For the budget vs. actual in the current fiscal year (through 9/29), projected income from donations shows an expectation of an additional \$7,929.39 by the end of the FY (May 31,2006).

05IBM11 IBM approves the Treasurer's Report.

Caroline Lanker presented the **Finance** committee report. [Attachment 4: Finance Committee Report]

Caroline reiterated that monthly apportionments have increased because of the decrease in individual contributions. The current line item for individual contributions is more realistic than past expectations. If adult members and attenders made an average contribution of \$12, budget goals would easily be met.

Concerning apportionments, it is recognized that some meetings cannot afford the suggested contribution while others can give more. Meetings should take this into consideration.

Regarding publications, there have been sizeable Walton and Michener pamphlet orders from Quaker Books, NYYM, FGC, and AFSC.

Dan Vaughen/DeLand PM gave the **Nominating Committee** report. [Attachment 5: Nominating Committee Report]

Friends approved the following minute:

Dan spoke to the importance of the SEYM web site. Also, the management of a good site is a highly specialized and skilled task. It is unreasonable to ask someone to donate time and effort without compensation.

The possibilities for the management of SEYM's webn site are (1) increase the administrative secretary's position from 3/4 to full with the website assignment, (2) hire a consultant, (3) or employ a part-timer with the necessary skills on a fee basis. Also, the matter of the non-functioning website committee should be addressed.

Friends will hold in the Light on how to resolve the matter, which was referred to Executive Committee.

05IBM14 IBM expresses appreciation to Palm Beach MM for the warm welcome and mindful hospitality provided to the Fall Interim Business Meeting, 2005. It is always renewing and invigorating to come together under the tender care of this meeting and these loving Friends.

The clerk expressed appreciation to the assistant clerk, recording clerk, and all Friends gathered for their contribution to the day's meeting.

The meeting ended in silent worship.

Attachment 4: Finance Committee Report to Fall IBM 10/01/2005

June 1, 2005 marked the beginning of the fiscal year 2005-06.

Summary of Financial Results for FY 2004-05

Here is a summary of financial results for last fiscal year.

General Fund

The General Fund basically broke even. This is good news, considering that we had been projecting a shortfall. We can credit several things for this:

All monthly meetings (except Augusta, which was laid down) contributed their full apportionment or very close to it, and some contributed above their apportionments. Most worship groups also contributed their full apportionment or else monthly meetings contributed for them.

Thanks to some generous individual contributions at the end of the year, the individual contributions (including donations made with Gathering registrations) totaled \$6414. This was less than the \$7895 budget for individual donations but more than double the individual donations in the previous year. See attachment for summary of individual contributions.

Expenses were \$2470 below budget, excluding triennial travel money (\$1050) which was set aside. The low expenses were partly because only two newsletters were published.

The unbudgeted expense for insurance (\$1111) was more than balanced by the unbudgeted income from the Trustees' Outreach Travel Fund (\$942) and the surplus from Half Yearly Meeting (\$392).

Another significant unbudgeted expense was \$2356 to cover the Gathering shortfall.

Half Yearly Meeting

Half Yearly Meeting produced a surplus, which enabled it to pay the \$400 site deposit for HYM 2005 plus transfer \$392 to the General Fund.

Michener Lecture

The Michener Lecture basically broke even, with a surplus of \$32 transferred to the Trustees' Michener Fund.

The Gathering/Walton Lecture

The Gathering had a deficit of \$1997, primarily because the food and lodging fees for attenders had not been raised, even though the Life Enrichment Center raised its fees. This deficit was made up from the General Fund. (Please note that this is not intended as a criticism of the Gathering Committee, who carried on valiantly in the face of unusual circumstances and produced a fine Gathering.)

Publications

Publications had a net income of \$1755.

Outlook for FY 2005-2006

The following is a summary of the current financial state of the YM and the outlook for the year.

General Fund

The General Fund began this fiscal year with a reserve of \$20,115 plus \$1949 carried over for triennial travel. For comparison, this year's budget is \$60,256.

Overall, we do not see any significant challenges in the budget. Apportionments for this year are up for most meetings, but we hope that the meetings will do as well as they did last year in contributing their apportionments. The individual income budget of \$2500 will be easier to meet than last year's. The expense budget seems frugal but adequate.

As of 9/29/05, meeting contributions totaled \$9391, which is behind schedule for the year (\$16619 pro-rated budget for this date). Seven out of 15 monthly meetings have made contributions and six of those have made more than one contribution. 1 worship group has contributed.

Half Yearly Meeting

We hope the HYM Committee will keep up the good work.

Michener Lecture

Since the Michener Lecture broke even this year and expenses, in general, are rising, the finances for the next Michener Lecture need some attention.

The income from the Trustees' Michener Fund, while helpful, is no longer enough to keep the "suggested donation" for the Michener lecture low. The Trustees have taken action on this and there has been a recent donation to the Michener Fund.

The Gathering/Walton Lecture

The Finance Committee will work with the Gathering Committee to produce a budget for Gathering 2005, with the goal of breaking even on expenses vs. income.

Publications

Publications began the fiscal year with a reserve of \$5395. Part of the reserve has been used to publish new pamphlets. Orders for our publications from the FGC bookstore, Quaker Bookshop at Friends House London (for the Ben Pink Dandelion pamphlet), New York YM (Linda Chidsey pamphlet), AFSC (Mary Lord pamphlet), Pendle Hill Bookstore and Quaker Earthcare Witness (Lisa Gould pamphlet) have put publications in the black already this year.

In the longer term, the publications reserve being built up now will be used to publish the new Faith and Practice.

Summary of Individual Contributions

In addition, \$250 was received with Gathering registrations, but I don't have the breakdown of individual donations within that.

Allowing for the fact that a few individuals made more than one donation and the unknown (but probably small) number of people who donated with the Gathering registration, the number of individuals who contributed was probably about 40. FY 2003-2004

There were 26 individual contributions totaling \$2636 plus \$463 donated with the Gathering registrations.
